This team approach starts with the International President and the Board and goes down through the Multiple District level to our Sub-District 11 C1. The District GMT is lead by PDG Rod Prys of Marne and is responsible for working with the clubs in recruiting new membership and the retention of the current membership. Also, they are responsible for the extension of new clubs in the District. The District GLT is lead by IPD Fran Osborne of the Lyons-Muir club and is responsible for the training of all Lions in the District starting with Club Officer Training and moving up to Zone Chair training.
